Dedication of new staves



Thank you to everyone who joined us for a special service of Choral Evensong celebrating St Stephen on July 18th, when new Churchwarden's and Verger's Staves were dedicated. We are grateful to all those who contributed to the cost of the new staves, including The Worshipful Company of Weavers and their Master, Alderman John Garbutt, Deputy James Thomson and the Worshipful Company of Grocers, a Churchwarden in memory of George Millington who served as a Churchwarden from 1963-2006, Mark Lewis (Designer) and Steve Wager (Silversmith) for their work and The Worshipful Company of Information Technologists and their Master, Dr Stefan Fafinski, who joined us at the service.



Light of the world!

During our Patronal Festival Evensong in July, Reverend Stephen dedicated two new candleholders which have been designed and created by Tony Gant in memory of his wife, Janet Gant; a loyal member of the St Stephen Walbrook community and an enthusiastic member of the St Stephen's Art Group.

Tony is a renowned potter and the candleholders have been specially designed for day-to-day use at St Stephen Walbrook; the size, colour and texture all considered to sit perfectly on top of our Henry Moore altar. The pottery is unglazed although Tony has added additional red clay and the 'roulette' pattern around the edge of the holders has been formed with a Meccano gear wheel – a technique Tony has been using since he began creating pots.

Tony was a student of the late Gwylm Thomas at Hammersmith School of Art and is a Fellow of the Craft Potters Association. He has been making his highly recognisable, glazed domestic stoneware since 1961. Tony's pieces are made using Devon ball clays, which are used to create his own clay bodies. His designs evoke a sense of landscape and distance through the intersection of unglazed clay across the blue, yellow or brown glazes, which he makes from basic raw materials. They are then fired in a gas kiln of Tony's own design and cooled for two days.

Parishioner Perspective....

The Museum of the Book

Over the summer Lynda Keen visited a little known but important museum in Tower Hamlets....

Tucked away in a side street off the Commercial Road inside a Baptist church is this little-known but very important museum. It contains a large number of Bibles in manuscript and print, along with other interesting texts, books and memorabilia, including ancient cuneiform tablets from Ur of the Chaldees, Torah scrolls and Quran texts.

There are original manuscripts of both the Old and New Testaments by John Wycliffe in the 14th century, the first ever translations into English. Also the first printed edition of Wycliffe's New Testament.

The earliest complete printed Bible is the Gutenberg Bible of 1455, written in Latin. First and early editions of Martin Luther's 16th century publications of the Bible and New Testament in German are on display. Also from the 16th century are the New Testament in English by William Tyndale and the first complete printed Bible in English translated by Myles Coverdale.

Another notable early Bible in the collection is a copy of the first edition of the 1539 Great Bible with a preface by Thomas Cranmer and the title page showing Henry VIII giving the Bible to Cranmer and Thomas Cromwell to distribute to the people. The first edition contains Cromwell's coat of arms. The museum also has a copy of a later edition with Cromwell's coat of arms removed because by then he had been executed for treason and heresy.

This fascinating collection was begun by Dr Jewell E Smith and is now curated by his son David and David's wife Eva. David is pastor of the Baptist church in which the museum is located – the Church of the Book at 270 Salmon Lane, London E14 7EU. Guided tours are free immediately after scheduled church services or you can book via the <https://www.museumofthebook.com/> website for a paid tour from Tuesday to Friday between 10am and 4pm. The nearest stations are Westferry or Limehouse DLR and buses D3, 15, 115 and 135 all stop at Salmon Lane.
