High Sheriff of Greater London

The origin of the title of Sheriff is "Shire Reeve" meaning guardian of the shire. This office has been proven to be in existence well over a thousand years ago and, as such, is the most ancient of all civic roles. It has therefore offered the longest continuous service to the Crown and was, for many hundreds of years in medieval times, responsible for tax collection and law enforcement which is no longer the case.

The first Sheriff for the County of London was created in 1889 to cover that growing part of London outside of the City. Prior to then the Sheriffs for London had always been the City Sheriffs because the City **was** London. Greater London was created at the same time as the County of London was abolished in 1965. In 1972 the role of the High Sheriff of Greater London was enshrined in statute within the Local Government Act of that year. It stated that "the Sheriffs appointed for a County, or Greater London, should be known as High Sheriffs".

Nowadays, appointed by Royal Warrant each year (April to April) the High Sheriff of Greater London is the Sovereign's personal representative for Law and Order in that geographic region. This means they are nominally responsible for all matters relating to the Judiciary and the Rule of Law across the 32 Boroughs, i.e. excluding the City. It is an independent, voluntary, non-executive and nonpolitical appointment whose ambit covers the following areas:

- Royal Courts of Justice (the High Courts)
- 9 Crown Courts (and Coroners Courts)
- 8 Prisons (including Young Offenders Institutions)
- Metropolitan Police
- 2 Chief Inspectorates (Prisons and Constabulary, Fire and Rescue Services)
- Numerous charities and other voluntary sector organisations involved in supporting the legal system.

As can be seen by the above list, the High Sheriff of Greater London's primary focus is on the main stakeholders involved in the legal system in Greater London. The main aspects of the role are to encourage, support and recognise those who are engaged in it.

The current High Sheriff of Greater London is John Garbutt, the first City Alderman for 125 years to be appointed High Sheriff of Greater London.

John is Alderman for Walbrook Ward in which the Church of St Stephen Walbrook is located.

St Stephen Walbrook

For over a thousand years a place of worship has stood on this site. Sir Christopher Wren's masterpiece, the present church, is the fourth to have stood here and was completed in 1679, after the previous larger church was destroyed in the Great Fire. At the time of its building the great dome was unique in England and it was from this church that Wren developed his plans for St Paul's Cathedral.

Here Sir John Vanbrugh is buried and many distinguished theologians, men of letters and of the arts have graced the life of this place. John Dunstable the composer and past merchants and Lord Mayors have been a part of its life.

There is a plaque to the Revd Robert Stuart De Courcey Laffan, who with Baron Pierre de Coubertin revived the Olympic Games in 1890. Bombed in the Second World War and restored to its present magnificent state in the 1980s, twentieth century artists and craftsmen have adorned its interior. Henry Moore's travertine marble altar now stands at the centre under Wren's dome surrounded by dazzling kneelers by Patrick Heron.

St Stephen Walbrook stands witness next to the Lord Mayor's residence and at the heart of the City it was built to serve. The church ministers to a varied community of workers in the varied businesses and services of the City and visitors, providing physical and online worship and musical and cultural events throughout the week. The principal service is Choral Eucharist at 12.45pm on Thursdays with mass settings performed by the choir. The church also hosts a long-running series of organ recitals on Friday lunchtimes.

The Samaritans were founded at St Stephen Walbrook in 1953 by Revd Chad Varah, who was rector for fifty years, and the church is also the home of the London Internet Church and its global ministry of prayer and praise.

First Reading

Isaiah 61: 1-9 Read by The Rt Hon. Lady Justice Kate Thirlwall, DBE, Senior Presiding Judge of England and Wales

The first lesson is written in the sixty first chapter of the book of the prophet Isaiah beginning at the first verse.

The Spirit of the Sovereign Lord is on me, because the Lord has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor.He has sent me to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour and the day of vengeance of our God, to comfort all who mourn, and provide for those who grieve in Zionto bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of joy instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair. They will be called oaks of righteousness, a planting of the Lord for the display of his splendour. They will rebuild the ancient ruins and restore the places long devastated; they will renew the ruined cities that have been devastated for generations. Strangers will shepherd your flocks; foreigners will work your fields and vineyards. And you will be called priests of the Lord, you will be named ministers of our God. You will feed on the wealth of nations, and in their riches you will boast. Instead of your shame you will receive a double portion, and instead of disgrace you will rejoice in your inheritance. And so you will inherit a double portion in your land, and everlasting joy will be yours. "For I, the Lord, love justice; I hate robbery and wrongdoing. Second Reading

Galatians 3:19-29 Read by Sir Kenneth Olisa, OBE, Lord Lieutenant of Greater London

The second lesson is written in the third chapter of Paul's letter to the Galatians beginning at the nineteenth verse.

Why then the law? It was added because of transgressions, until the offspring would come to whom the promise had been made; and it was ordained through angels by a mediator. Now a mediator involves more than one party; but God is one.

Is the law then opposed to the promises of God? Certainly not! For if a law had been given that could make alive, then righteousness would indeed come through the law. But the scripture has imprisoned all things under the power of sin, so that what was promised through faith in Jesus Christ might be given to those who believe.

Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith. But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian, for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise.

Here ends the second lesson.

Third Reading

Matthew 12:1-8 Read by Dame Cressida Dick, DBE, QPM, Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police Service

The third lesson is written in the twelfth chapter of the gospel according to St Matthew beginning at the first verse.

At that time Jesus went through the grainfields on the sabbath; his disciples were hungry, and they began to pluck heads of grain and to eat. When the Pharisees saw it, they said to him, "Look, your disciples are doing what is not lawful to do on the sabbath." He said to them, "Have you not read what David did when he and his companions were hungry? He entered the house of God and ate the bread of the Presence, which it was not lawful for him or his companions to eat, but only for the priests. Or have you not read in the law that on the sabbath the priests in the temple break the sabbath and yet are guiltless? I tell you, something greater than the temple is here. But if you had known what this means, 'I desire mercy and not sacrifice,' you would not have condemned the guiltless. For the Son of Man is lord of the sabbath."

Here ends the third lesson.
